In my work in the city, I participate with the "Coalition for Peace" (CAP). This coalition is formed through the work of the Office of Violence Prevention at the City level. Over 100 organizations and non-profits come together to work toward a kinder Pomona. One of the people I met was Lucy Ramos, a remarkable Christian woman who, having left street life, has given much of her career life to working with kids on the street. This skill is rare and so needed in our city. She hosts an annual event to help people process the loss of a loved one, especially those due to violence. We said yes to helping her

Pomona Fellowship support for grieving parents

Pomona Fellowship through our Service and Outreach Commission assisted Lucy Ramos of the Pomona organization, "Foundations of Change Through Youth" to sponsor an event for grieving parents that have experienced the death of a child through street violence or excess drugs. The event was held on Saturday, April 26 th from 11 a.m. to p.m.

There were special guest speakers, time for parents to share their grief, and special events including canvas painting, journaling, letters to loved ones, a place to post a picture of their loved one on a memorial canvass, and assistance from participating organizations with counseling or assistance abilities. Food, water and hot coffee were provided.



Bethany Theological Seminary

The Seminary class of 2025
graduated at the commencement
ceremony on May 10. Eleven
Masters Degrees and fourteen
Graduate Certificates and Post
Graduate Diplomas were awarded.

Gifts to Bethany sustain the important continuing work of educating for ministry leadership that is challenged by and nurtured by the testimonies of the Church of the Brethren. Pomona Fellowship donates \$400 to Bethany through this year's budget and additional funds from individual gifts to Bethany.

Bethany is currently involved in a 5-year fund raising campaign

entitled "Flourish: A Campaign for Bethany Theological Seminary." The goal of this campaign is \$12 million to enhance the student experience, encourage faculty creativity and innovation, finance support for Nigerian Ministry training, bolster annual fund raising, and enable students to complete their seminary education without increasing any indebtedness.

Enrollment at Bethany has been growing over the past several years both in residential and on-line student enrollment. The scholarship program that enables students to not need to borrow more money and a community outreach program into the City of Richmond, Indiana, have encouraged students to enroll.

"Dress A Girl" Sewing Party

"Dress-a-Girl," is a program where folks come together to cut & sew dresses for orphaned girls in other countries. The dress may be the only new item of clothing they have ever owned. This would be a good time to invite people who would like to learn to sew as well. All levels of skill are encouraged to attend. Mission and Ministry Board adopts resolution on weapons transfers

resolution on weapons transfers was top of the agenda for the Mission and Ministry Board's spring meeting March 7-9. The resolution was presented by staff of the Office of Peacebuilding and Policy. It was adopted as a resolution of the board and recommended to the 2026 Annual Conference.

The document focuses on the international arms trade, the arms industry, and the part played by the United States as currently the world's largest exporter of weapons. It reviews the church's long history of opposition to war and militarization and reaffirms commitment to peace as God's will and the call of Christ. It includes a section of recommendations for the individual, congregational, district, and denominational levels. A concern was expressed to also address gun violence in the US, and conversation ensued about how to accommodate that concern.

Among other business, the board restructured its committees to, in part, continue the work of the Seeking God's Racial Justice task team; received reports including the general secretary's review of his trip to the Dominican Republic with Annual Conference moderator Dava Hensley; and received updates from staff on the situation of immigrants and refugees.



National Youth Cabinet meets

he National Youth Cabinet met March 21-23 to plan for National Youth Sunday 2025 and National Youth Conference 2026.

Youth members are Daniel Bowen from McPherson, Kan. (Western Plains District), Nissie Cadette from Coral Springs, Fla. (Atlantic Southeast District), Kayleigh Chapman from Hagerstown, Md. (Mid-Atlantic District), Zach Diamond from Eden, N.C. (Virlina District), Tyson Hall from Mount Sidney, Va. (Shenandoah District), and Katie Phipps from Bremen, Ind. (Northern Indiana District).

Adult advisors are Rod Matz of Asheville, Ohio (Northern Ohio District) and Emily Van Pelt of Rocky Mount, Va. (Virlina District).

NYC coordinators Anna Schweitzer and Rachel Johnson and Becky Ullom Naugle, director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries, also met with the cabinet.

Bethany board hears about initiative with colleges

he Bethany Seminary board in its March 21-22 meeting heard about plans for an initiative with the Church of the Brethren-related colleges and universities.

President Jeff Carter shared about the new program, in which the seminary will formalize its partnership with the six Church of the Brethren-related colleges and universities. Bethany will soon

offer students at those institutions the opportunity to take graduate courses while remaining as undergraduates at their home institutions.

All the undergraduate schools have expressed strong interest in this initiative, according to a Bethany release. The initiative will allow students to earn both a bachelor's degree from a churchrelated college or university and a graduate certificate or master's degree from Bethany during a four- to five-year timeframe. Manchester University in North Manchester, Ind., will pilot the new initiative this fall.

Among other business, the board took time to remember and celebrate former vice chair Michele Firebaugh, who died last year, and honored departing board members Chris Bowman and John Flora.

Grants given

Emergency Disaster Fund

Two grants continue work with Ekklesiyar Yan'uwa a Nigeria (EYN, the Church of the Brethren in Nigeria):

- \$185,000 supports the Nigeria Crisis Response program for 2025, focusing on home repairs and water projects to allow displaced families to return home.
- \$25,000 goes to EYN's response to extreme flooding in Maiduguri.

Four grants aid those affected by the invasion of the city of Goma in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC):

- \$30,000 supports l'Eglise des Freres au Congo (Church of the Brethren in the DRC) in its Rapid Response to the invasion of Goma, providing food and water to church members and others.
- \$20,000 went to l'Eglise des Freres au Congo to provide food and water to church members and others trapped in South Kivu Province by the fighting.
- \$15,000 went to the Church of the Brethren in Burundi for an aid program for refugees fleeing the violence.
- \$8,600 assisted the Rwanda Church of the Brethren to rebuild or repair 11 homes damaged in fighting between M23 rebels and the Congolese military.

Two grants were given to the International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC):

- \$30,000 for a humanitarian response to the Israel-Hamas war in Gaza, specifically a program for children with disabilities living in the Al-Maghazi Refugee Camp.
- \$70,000 to a Russia-Ukraine war response focused on women's programing in the Zakarpattia region.

■ \$5,000 covered the Children's Disaster Services response to the Los Angeles wildfires early this year.

Global Food Initiative

- \$5,000 helped the Haiti Medical Project drill a well in an underserved community among congregations of l'Église des Frères d'Haïti (the Church of the Brethren in Haiti).
- \$4,999.50 went to the Great Lakes Bible School in Rwanda for students' theological and biblical education to be combined with practical knowledge in sustainable farming.
- \$4,906 went to the Church of the Brethren in Burundi for training on Farming God's Way techniques that use fewer resources, conserve water, and improve soils without chemical inputs.

Brethren Faith in Action Fund

Grants of \$5,000 each went to

- Circle of Peace Church of the Brethren for an open house and mailer outreach.
- GraceWay International Community Church of the Brethren for community outreach to nearby housing complexes.

- Highland Avenue Church of the Brethren for its support to newcomers in need in the local community.
- Sebring Church of the Brethren to upgrade the sound system in support of outreach ministries.
- Shepherd's Heart Fellowship to support people in need in the area.
- Spirit of Peace Church of the Brethren for a Gun Buy Back Program.
- San Diego Church of the Brethren for its Welcoming Heart Ministry.

Grants of less than \$5,000 went to

- Eden Church of the Brethren for a community meal called Brethren Bistro.
- Harrisburg First Church of the Brethren for the Shalom Summit held on Feb. 22.
- Ivester Church of the Brethren for a meal ministry combined with worship called "First Sundays," held at Camp Pine Lake.
- Onekama Church of the Brethren for a ministry to support homeless people in partnership with ECHO His Love.
- Roaring Spring Church of the Brethren for a Wednesday night Recharge Program.
- The Veritas congregation for five missional outreach opportunities.
