The witness of hospitality

Many churchgoers would describe their congregation as "friendly," but we should make a clear distinction between "friendliness" and "hospitality." Friendliness is a fine starting point, but its embrace may not be as wide or as deep as Christian hospitality. Through the lens of Christian faith, hospitality becomes a countercultural expression of love that elevates us above fear of the "other" and compels us to welcome the stranger.

One of the post-resurrection stories in John offers a glimpse of how Christian hospitality bears witness to Jesus Christ. In John 21, a stranger found Jesus' disciples fishing without success, and he encouraged them to try again. When they did, the disciples hauled in a miraculous catch (21:6).

Not long after this, the stranger asked the disciples to eat breakfast with him; he had already prepared a fire of burning coals to cook the fish. Through the hospitality of a shared meal, the disciples recognized that the stranger was Jesus.

When we offer compassion and generosity to people in our congregations and our communities — especially in a socially and politically polarized climate — we bear witness to the presence of Christ among us.

As we strive to be hospitable, the goal should be to make everyone feel more seen, included and valued. One challenge for leaders is to think about what this means in worship and congregational life.

Who is in our community? Who is missing from our community? What are the barriers in our congregational structures that keep people from experiencing the love of God? A faithful reading of Scripture tells us that hospitality is not a destination. Hospitality is a spiritual practice that invites us to reflect and then act.

Team requests help with legal funding, expertise

he Deportation Defense Response Team, an initiative of church districts, has received many requests for legal expertise and funding to support immigrants in local communities. Recognizing this as a great need for vulnerable church members and neighbors, the team is making two requests:

- For congregations to take up special offerings and do fundraising to support church members and others who face immigration challenges and are in need of legal support. Donations can be sent through the Atlantic Southeast District office. Contact atlanticsoutheastcob@gmail.com.
- For connections with Church of the Brethren lawyers willing to help people navigate immigration forms and situations, and also people who are not lawyers but who are familiar with immigration law and forms. This involvement may range from consultation to representation, pro bono or at reduced cost. The team wants to organize a legal orientation session for lawyers who want to help. Letter supports multicultural welcome at Conference

he Inter-Agency Forum (Annual Conference officers and director, general secretary, representatives of the district executives, and leadership of the Conference agencies) in May issued a letter announcing measures to ensure multicultural welcome at the Conference in Greensboro, N.C.

Citing Romans 15:5-7, the letter said, in part: "Our desire, as church leaders, is for all people to feel safe and welcome at the Annual Conference." The letter celebrated cultural and racial diversity in the church but also acknowledged that international guests and certain racial

and ethnic groups within the Church of the Brethren in the US may find traveling to this year's Conference particularly challenging. It announced creation of an action plan for Annual Conference to support multicultural commitments and ensure the widest welcome to those traveling to Greensboro.



Mary Abraham of the Office of Peacebuilding and Policy represented the denomination at an ecumenical prayer vigil in Phoenix,

Ariz., expressing solidarity with the San Carlos Apache Tribe's effort to protect the sacred site Chí'chil Biłdagoteel-known in English as Oak Flat, part of the Tonto National Forest land. The event affiliated with Creation Justice Ministries coincided with a federal court hearing on the Trump administration's effort to transfer the land to Resolution Copper, a foreign-owned mining corporation. Lawsuits on behalf of the Apache people argued the destruction of Oak Flat will violate federal protections for religious freedom. However, on May 27 the Supreme Court made a decision allowing transfer of the land to the copper mining company.

Disabilities network renews partnership

The Anabaptist Disabilities Network (ADN) and the Church of the Brethren through its Discipleship and Leadership Formation unit have renewed the partnership that supports congregations in becoming more inclusive of people with disabilities and mental illness.

A memo of understanding outlines a collaborative partnership focused on disability inclusion and accessibility throughout the denomination. ADN continues as the primary provider of disability ministry support for the Church of the Brethren, offering education, consultation, and resources for congregations and districts, as well as accessibility services and continuing education at denominational gatherings.

In return, the Church of the Brethren contributes annual financial support to ADN and supports its mission by contributing articles to ADN publications and inviting churches to become ADN partner congregations. The Church of the Brethren continues to hold an ex officio seat on the ADN board.

District disaster coordinators trained

Brethren Disaster Ministries recently oriented new district disaster coordinators, welcoming seven into the role: Troy Barnhart as a co-district disaster coordinator in Middle Pennsylvania District; Gary Benesh in Southeastern District; Wendy Russell in Michigan District; and the South Central Indiana District team of Bill Baxter, Bill Gay, Seth Hendricks, and Kay Theel.

Several district disaster coordinators have "retired" from the volunteer position: Cliff Kindy in South Central Indiana District, Bob Schnepp in Michigan District, and Pam and Rick Brady in Southeastern District.

Andrew Duffy has begun as interim transition director for On Earth Peace to help update and develop processes for its decentralized workplace and plan for future staffing. His career spanning 15-plus countries has focused on people and organizations navigating conflict and change.

Kevin Daggett and Rebecca House begin Sept. 15 as co-district executive ministers for Shenandoah District. Daggett has served in pastoral ministry for more than 30 years in Shenandoah, Southeastern, and Virlina districts, and is currently pastor of Dayton (Va.) Church of the Brethren and chair of Shenandoah's leadership team. He will also direct ministerial services, an eighth-time district position. House has served in pastoral ministry for 17 years in Shenandoah, MidAtlantic, and Southern Ohio and Kentucky districts and currently is associate pastor of Staunton (Va.) Church of the Brethren. She will continue quarter-time as director of district conference and youth services.

Charlotte Bear and Rusty Curling began May 1 as regional ministry associates for Mid-Atlantic District, a new role at the district level. The need for better connections between the district and congregations was identified during the interim period between the retirement of Gene Hagenberger and the call of Doug Veal as district executive minister.

Betty M. Wills retired June 30 as Virlina District administrative assistant, after serving the district for 17 years and serving as a church administrative assistant for more than 30 years.
